

However, following three months of Surval Education being online, we have all returned this academic year very excited to resume face-to-face lessons. The opportunity to debate and discuss, to question and consider, to think and challenge has been much appreciated this year.






Last term, our focus was to develop our approach to Flipped Learning which enables students to study, consider and understand a topic and content in advance of each lesson. This leads to higher level conversations, fascinating questions and time to process and think through subject material. Surval teachers have been creative, determined and thorough in initiating different ways to help the girls develop independent and critical thinking skills. We are delighted that this has been appreciated by the students.

focused on critical thinking skills and the ability to ask questions, work collaboratively and be empowered independently; critical life skills as well as heightening girls' future prospects. Debate has been launched as a separate, timetabled subject giving all girls the opportunity to develop their reasoning skills, respond to challenge and to structure, evidence and deliver their points of view. Additionally, in lessons the girls have been engaged in Socratic Seminars, mentoring sessions, acting as teachers to their peers and questioning the material around them. Their confidence levels, engaging with higher order thinking skills, has increased significantly, evidenced by student feedback and progress - all very exciting, to say the least!

This term we have built on Flipped Learning and

Debate is good for the soul. It is exciting, invigorating and wonderfully insightful. It provides an opportunity to discuss, consider, evolve and develop your own line of thinking.

It also provides the opportunity to carry out research, think on your feet and to actively listen. Whilst such skills are incredibly attractive to universities and future employers, debate also helps to open the minds of those involved, allowing them to see others' perspectives. This is so important in a world divided by politics, misunderstandings and opinion.

Introducing Debate on the Surval timetable has been an exciting initiative. We are surrounded by bright, curious, intelligent and determined individuals who are passionate about contributing to the world around them. Beginning with a programme of British Parliamentary Debate and then moving on to Public Forum Debating, it has been wonderful to have the classroom taken over by critical thinkers. Delivering well-structured speeches, actively engaging in discussion and raising high quality points of information have been rewarding, satisfying and a true compliment to the ability and commitment of our girls. From our Foundation Year to our Swiss Gap students, girls have come together to debate, responding to time pressure, learning debate etiquette and structure.



It has been a pleasure to see their improvement, to see their confidence grow and I have no doubt that many of our girls will continue to debate at the highest level for years to come.

"Before coming to Surval I had never participated or learned about debate, so I decided that it would be a good opportunity to take part in the Masterclass and try something new. Through that and our weekly classes with Mr Smale, I learned how important debate is; as a skill to have, it will be very useful in my future life. 
Leah (USA), CEO for the Gala Dinner project in aid of HFH (Habitat for Humanity), shares her experience of leading a fundraising campaign.

This year, we are supporting the Habitat for Humanity Deutschland project in Malawi where a huge problem is the sanitation in schools in light of COVID-19. HFH aims to raise funds for the construction of sustainable and user-friendly facilities for water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) in schools. Due to COVID-19, we have been unable to volunteer on site this year, but this has made us even more determined to raise funds and make a positive change for this worthy cause. We believe education is fundamental in a child's life and that children should feel comfortable and safe at their schools. So we are raising funds to help create a healthier educational environment for Malawian children. We aim to raise at least CHF 1'000.

This decision is particularly pertinent this year where many students worldwide have not been able to attend school in person.

"You take school for granted until it is taken away... we would do anything to get back into school"

Fundraising for HFH so far this year has been our Surval Café (CHF 2/3 for goodies), Starbucks delivery service (CHF 10) and our Valentine's Fundraiser. The Gala Dinner is our biggest event, taking place on Wednesday 28 April 2021. The theme of the evening is 'Starry Night' following the idea "no matter where you are, we are all connected". Tickets are CHF 20 and the evening will include a three-course meal, speeches, entertainment and more!



This year there have been limitations due to the pandemic. Numbers are limited so there can be no guests, and this in turn restricts the amount which can be raised on the night. A giving platform has been set up for any generous donors who would like to contribute to the cause.

Leah reflects, "The highlights for me personally have been being so connected with HFH, I have always known about them as they are such a big non-profit organisation and it's been fascinating getting to know more about them and their mission. Also, working all together on one project; qualities and personalities really come out.

From this experience, I have gained management skills, having managed a team; learnt to think creatively for fundraising ideas, to follow planned steps and procedures, to handle costs and expenses."

The girls should all be really proud of how they have persevered with their fundraising and planning especially with the disappointment of a mission not being possible, and the frustrations felt by the limited scope for fundraising. Global Perspectives

Sustainable Surval!

This term, Surval's Sustainability Society has been supporting Protect our Winters (POW) by raising funds and awareness selling POW merchandise (hot water bottles, tank tops, stickers, T-shirts). They have also been planning for the planting of the Surval Sustainability Garden ready for spring.

According to leading Society member Faith (Swiss Gap, Botswana), everyone in the Surval community is sustainability-sensitive and the Society reinforce this every Thursday by handing out sustainability trivia and how it affects us and the world around us. Faith says "It's always on people's radar even if they can't attend the club".





Meeting on Wednesday afternoons, support for the Sustainability Society tends to be slightly seasonal, with more participants joining as the warmer weather sets in, attracted to our inspiring Sustainability Garden.

Faith explains, "As the garden evolves and it becomes sunny, girls start to garden and join. The garden outside the school is beautiful and therapeutic and we can plant what we want. Two years ago we planted cherry blossom trees which usually bloom in April. We still have our rosemary plants... Usually we plant fruits like strawberries and melons, and vegetables like peppers. We like to plant a balance of fruits and veg... Then once it's grown our chefs cook with it!"

International Women's Day

To celebrate International Women's Day (Week!) at Surval in March, we took on this year's theme #choosetochallenge, with our girls exploring issues related to gender inequality and girls' education worldwide.

Delving into inspirational women and their actions, we focused on Malala Yousafzai and her Fund, supporting girls in the world's most vulnerable communities who are currently unable to access quality education and distance learning. What do you #choosetochallenge?

New this term, our Online Conference Series has inspired our Swiss Gap students, with 'visiting' speakers joining us to share experience in social enterprise and (in strictest confidence) the luxury brand industry.

"The conferences broaden global perspectives with the sharing of valuable experiences and heighten awareness of the challenges and opportunities the modern world offers this generation, highlighting skills to develop as future leaders."

Crista (Swiss Gap, Guatemala)


Crista has always known of Surval - having relatives who studied here, friends who recommended us and having seen Mrs Woodhouse visit her school in Guatemala 2 years ago.

Crista applied to Surval before the pandemic impacted freedom of travel, so anticipated being able to travel and join our annual trip to Kenya with Habitat for Humanity. "But with covid my expectations changed!" she says "It's been different to what I'd imagined, but not in a bad way!"

Highlights so far have included skiing, the discussion topics covered in international relations and independent travel. Crista's favourite of the 8 Swiss destinations she has visited is Lucern, "it's the prettiest!" When asked how her Surval Experience has been, Crista replies:

"I like it a lot, I would totally recommend it! I've made great friends, discovered new things and places. I've enjoyed the liberty given to me and the trust the school has in me. It's a very safe environment and it's cool to have such a place with such diversity and cultures".

"I just wanted to improve my French and get to know more people. My goal is to learn 4 languages, and I am now learning German also!" So taking up Italian and German whilst at Surval and improving her French and English has fulfilled this goal. As for the friends she's made here? "They are the best friends I have ever had!"

"I have tried new things and become more open minded" she adds, "learning new tricks on the slopes, snowboarding jumps, hiking and even just walking in town; for safety reasons, I can't do this at home!"

"Surval has helped me increase my confidence through public speaking, debating and events. I have made friends from all over the world, and my languages have improved a lot. The highlights of this term have been meeting new people, making and having friends in another language; improving my French, German, and Italian; I've enjoyed Etiquette and know it will help me; sledging and travelling alone: cycling the city in Bern, visiting Zurich, seeing lots of Switzerland...There wasn't a weekend that we stayed in!"

Layla (Grade 11. Switzerland)

Layla has had a whirlwind year having come from Seychelles

to school in Switzerland, moving to Dubai where she joined an international school before she and her family decided Dubai was not for them and returned to Switzerland.

Layla says, "This is a nice school... my mum found out about it; we visited and I'm really liking it so far. As my first time at a boarding school, it's a good experience – it has helped me gain so much independence. I am doing surprisingly well which is really nice, with all the changes in my life recently, this is one that I am really proud of."

"I am doing American High School which I feel is a better system for me – the A Level system nor the IB seemed to work for me." (Mrs Woodhouse reports that Layla is very bright and has a lot of depth; Surval's new way of teaching suits Layla very well. Apparently Layla has discovered she has a good brain and is smart. She is a very talented artist as well.)

Layla didn't know what to expect in joining Surval:

"It is one of the best experiences I would always recommend to someone, especially for someone like me who wasn't very independent."

"Personally, I have been able to do things like set up my own bank account, order my own train tickets – I've figured out I can deal with any situation that is thrown at me. Independence develops your critical thinking, you have to think on your feet 24/7"

Layla's best experience at Surval has been meeting the people "...especially after being online for 5 months, learning at home in my family. I've never really been a very open person, but I've met some really amazing people so far."

And what of the future and Layla's aspirations? Assuming Layla stays on next year to graduate, she says she would love to study APs, and to be able to take part in more clubs and activities. And beyond Surval? "I have always had an aim to head towards hospitality, especially as Seychelles is so based on hospitality, that seems a good route for me."

Vicky (FY, England)

Vicky joined Surval this term, driving through 3 countries from England to arrive in time for the start of term "It's so nice not to be learning online!" she says.



Vicky had to quarantine in her room for 10 days on arrival at Surval; she is bubbly and enthusiastic:

"It was fine – I had Netflix, meals on wheels and a fabulous view!"

Surval has met Vicky's expectations, she affirms. The size of the school community suits her, and she likes the one-to-one attention and the freedom to go out at the weekends.

Highlights of the term have been the weekend trips to Montreux and Geneva for shopping and Vicky has loved skiing, "Ski Week was really fun and the instructor was really good... Sledging and snow mobiling was the best!"



Seeteh (Grade 10, Saudi Arabia)

Seeteh spent all of last term learning online from home in Saudi Arabia and joined Surval in person in January, as soon as travel restrictions were lifted. Seeteh has debuted on the slopes this term, and as she is unable to return home due to restrictions, she is remaining at Surval over Easter and is planning to learn to ride a bike – with Mrs Woodhouse (with over 55 years' experience of pedalling) as her coach. Language & Culture

The Surval Masterclass Series

New this term, our new Surval Masterclass series is aimed at inspiring our girls, nurturing their passions and interests as well as discovering new talents and flair.

Masterchef Masterclass

Our monthly Masterchef Masterclasses are hosted by Professor Jérôme Baxas. With his background of nearly 20 years teaching at leading Swiss Hospitality Schools, Chef Baxas is taking our girls' culinary skills and knowledge to another level! This term, they have conjured up tartelette fine croustillante à la provençale, chicken ballantine, superb sushi (sashimi and maki with salmon, avocado and crab) and fabulous fresh cream éclairs.

Our girls benefit from learning techniques, recipes and methods all enhancing their catering skills. With Jérôme's new, innovative twists and expert tips, the girls receive invaluable help and advice from an incredibly talented chef.

Art Masterclass

Our Art Masterclass in February focused on Fashion and Design. Visiting Artist Elise Buddle (along with online model, Rosie) captivated us all with her fun, interactive, informative and highly creative 90 minute sessions. Showing our girls how to draw and dress figures and how to make the biggest impact when doing so, Elise left us intent to learn more.

"It changed how I see Art (it's not just painting and drawing it's also clothes and more) and that there's more to clothes and fashion (how they're designed). I really enjoyed it!" Vicky (FY, England)

Jewellery Masterclass

This term's Jewellery Masterclasses have dazzled our students! Hosted online by Survalienne jewellery designer Amalia Lopez (1996, Mexico), new talents and fabulous creativity have sparked in our girls as they mastered the intricacies of crafting bracelets, necklaces, earrings and even rings. Amalia shares her Masterclass moments with us:

"We had our Jewellery Workshop over a fortnight in March, and although this year it was an online course, it was still amazing!

With great expectation and anticipation, I planned the classes; working out a way to adapt the course from normal, presenting online, hoping that I would be able to teach all the techniques and most important of all, inspire and communicate the beauty in design.

Preparation began weeks before, with the great Dagmar and Danica at Surval helping me unpack all the materials, organise them, and then themselves learning the techniques beforehand in a mini-crash course we had together so they could assist the groups in person.

The day came when I saw all the girls enter the Art Room... ohhh how I wish I could be there with them! I missed seeing their faces like I do every year when they spot all the coloured materials on the table and say: 'It's like we are at a store and we can have anything we like!'

This year, I felt their excitement! They loved the materials, were attentive and concentrated, and after each jewellery technique was explained, they were having fun! That was so important for me, that they enjoyed the experience. The girls created bracelets, necklaces, earrings, hoops, all in different designs and colours.

My biggest surprise was the day when the girls started showing me all the jewellery they had made, including rings! I had not taught them how to make rings; they figured it out themselves. That is the best feedback, the best reward, as a teacher. When creativity flows in such a way that your students can create their own jewels, combining techniques and just experimenting with colours, materials and their imagination, that is just the best design experience. This course also taught us that creativity is stronger and transcends any social distancing."



"I didn't realise I would be good at jewellery making.. like making earrings and bracelets! The jewellery workshops awakened my creative skills and my desire to see other ways to make things beautiful!"

Savoir-Vineyard!

Savoir-vivre, the art of living; the importance of good manners which are defined by the ability to behave appropriately in a given social and cultural setting in addition to interacting appropriately with others. Surval's Savoir-vivre programme explores personal organisation, cultures and customs around the world, table manners, dress code, posture, personal style and colour analysis, the art of conversation, formal and informal invitations, formal table service, wine/food pairing, hospitality and workplace etiquette.

Following our Swiss Gap students' wine pairing session as part of their Savoir-vivre programme, we ventured to the stunning Lavaux Vineyard Terraces-Lutry, which was a real treat. Exploring the vineyard and its fabulous vines, seeing for ourselves where the wine was made, learning which grapes grow in specific conditions; their taste, their specific requirements and how they are processed. The girls enjoyed seeing in person the starting point of the wine and the impact of the sun on the grapes, the wine's sweetness, colour and scent. The day wrapped up with an exhilarating scenic hike from Chexbrex to Lutry in the glorious spring sunshine.

Vive les Polyglottes!

Language is the most fascinating and direct link to other cultures and being able to communicate in a variety of languages is an essential skill which empowers our students and broadens their horizons. Extensive studies have also shown how learning another language enhances one's cognitive abilities, irrespective of chosen language or learner's age.

Due to popular demand, this term we have introduced Italian and German at Surval. Three students have taken up the opportunity for Italian Language and Culture classes. Our personalised programme focuses on a wide range of everyday interactions, grammar, culture and traditions, geography and travel. Once learners feel confident in their progress, we encourage them to work towards an internationally recognised certificate (CELI, PLIDA, or CILS). We are delighted that one girl is now taking the CELI 1 Elementary level external examination.
