Message from the Principal

Dear All,

As I reflect back on the Winter Term, I appreciate why it is such a highlight of the Surval experience from start to finish! This newsletter will give you a feel of the range of enriching, challenging and inspiring activities and initiatives in which girls have been engaged this term. We have been incredibly fortunate to have enjoyed many glorious blue sky days on the slopes and each and every girl has developed her skills and grown in confidence on skis. The impact on the girls' wellbeing of at least half a day, often a lot more, engaged in healthy physical activity and personal challenge is tangible. I look forward to this continuing into the Spring Term when skiing will be replaced with a programme of outdoor activities more suited to the summer weather - watersports, cycling, climbing and hiking.



We have been joined this term by new girls at almost every grade, alongside Winter Campers. However short or long a period the Winter Campers joined us for, they have embraced the full experience, progressed their English or French language and ski skills and slotted quickly into the social life of the house. It is always sad to say goodbye to girls but I know thoughts of returning to Surval longer term are on at least a few of their minds.

At Surval we talk a lot about our value of Courage. During the Winter Term the girls have undoubtedly demonstrated courage on the slopes and taken pride in themselves when they have pushed themselves out of their comfort zone and tested their resilience. When asked about their highlights of ski week in



Anzère, many mentioned those moments which they found harder: the day of bad weather when visibility was very poor and disorientating, or night skiing. Resilience is such a vital trait for future success in a fast-changing world where flexibility and adaptability will be required.

Amongst the 58 girls in the House this term, over 17 nationalities have been represented. We celebrated this diversity during our Languages and Culture focus in February. Encouraging girls to appreciate and show sensitivity and openness, another Surval value, to cultural differences and different global perspectives is part of an international education and sets girls up to enter an increasingly global society and workplace. In our small global community girls learn to respect each other's different perspectives and support each other as they face up to different challenges impacting on their home countries. I hope that we have now weathered the worst of the pandemic which certainly disrupted routine for some during the first few weeks of this term. This has been an incredibly difficult period for schools, businesses and families around the world, and I send my sincere thanks to all parents, staff and all Surval partners for your continued support during this period of such uncertainty. With the lifting of almost all restrictions during the course of this term, we have been able to return to events enjoyed pre-COVID, including whole school social events. As we approach the end of term, we are gearing up for our final highlight with our annual Fundraising Gala dinner organised by our

Swiss Gap students. 'The Road to Olympus' themed dinner promises to be a special evening and will raise money for the students' chosen charity in support of Ukrainian refugees.





School development *t*lan

In January I had pleasure in sharing Surval 2025 with all parents, which outlined my 5 key commitments for the school's development in the coming vears, namely:

- Inspiring and empowering young women for future success and influence
- Setting girls up for future success and high achievement through flexible and tailored academic pathways
- Developing strong global competence for success in a global workplace
- Creating powerful stories through adventure and challenge
- · Optimising the Surval experience through the environment

The document outlines what these commitments will look like in practice and initiatives are in development to drive these commitments. Please do access the document to read more.

As I complete my first year in Surval I continue to keep all aspects of Surval's programmes under review, from our academic and pastoral programmes, to our clubs, activities and residential trips. I am committed to ensuring that all aspects of Surval's provision are of the highest quality, meet the girls' needs, provide a breadth of experience and are relevant for today's world. Surval Montreux is a unique school and has the potential to be truly exceptional in all regards.

Changes Implemented This Year

My priorities have been informed by observations and discussions with all members of the Surval community, but most importantly with the girls. Students are invited to provide feedback to staff at any time, alongside regular scheduled opportunities for feedback and ideas, for instance through Student Voice and through termly Principal:Student 1:1 check ins. Key developments which have been implemented since August 2021 include:

- The school day schedule has been revised leading to greater flow and focus in learning and balance to support academic progress and wellbeing;
- · A selection of Advanced Placement courses has been introduced to add academic challenge:
- A Student Code of Conduct has been introduced, supported by a system of rewards and consequences, to ensure a shared understanding of and respect for expectations;
- The fitness room has been moved into a larger space and the equipment enhanced:
- A professional drop-in counselling service is being introduced from April; • A new programme of adventure sport activities is planned for the Spring
- Term with options in watersports, cycling, climbing and hiking; • Online student-parent-teacher consultations have been introduced to enhance
- home-school communication and understanding of student progress;
- The fifth floor teaching corridor has been refurbished leading to a brighter study environment;
- The student kitchen for Culinary Arts has been refurbished.

New School Leadership Appointments for 2022-2023

As we look ahead to 2022-23, new Leadership appointments have been made for August 2022: Head of Learning, Teaching and Assessment and Head of Enrichment and Leadership. These new Leadership positions will drive developments in these two key areas and ensure strong academic standards are matched by a broad, high quality, engaging extra-curricular programme and the explicit promotion of personal and leadership development. The recruitment of a new Head of Pastoral Care and Wellbeing to lead boarding, pastoral care and wellbeing across the school is currently underway.

Parent Survey Results

As part of this ongoing process of review, I am very grateful to all parents who recently completed our Parents' Survey. Feedback is always incredibly helpful in informing our development planning. It was good to have the strengths of Surval endorsed through the results and we have picked out a selection of some of the highest scores, which have been highlighted in the infographic you will find on the next page.

Areas of Further Development Currently Under Review

There were a few areas where our satisfaction level is lower and we will look at these areas with particular focus. Our lowest satisfaction levels of 78% were in the range of extra-curricular activities, promotion of a healthy lifestyle, and boarding accommodation, together with a number of comments pointing to a lack of academic rigour. I hope the developments already underway, as highlighted above, alongside a number of new leadership appointments, will go a long way to driving improvements around these areas of concern.

Academic Standards and Curriculum Provision

On the academic side, we are looking critically at how we make sure that our standards and curriculum provision ensure girls coming from different school backgrounds continue to make strong progress during their time at Surval regardless of their entry point. Enrichment is a core part of the Surval experience and we are reviewing the enrichment provision to ensure it meets the needs and interests of the girls in order to inspire high levels of motivation, whilst challenging them to step out of their comfort zone with activities they may not have tried. With regards to boarding accommodation, we are continuing our programme of refurbishment and enhancement of the facilities in place and will be looking at the feasibility of a comprehensive upgrade of residential accommodation over the coming years.

Students' Wellbeing and Healthy Lifestyle

With wellbeing and the students' welfare our primary concern at all times, we continually strive to improve in this area. I am pleased to announce that we will have a drop-in counselling service available in the school from April. This will be available one evening a week on a trial basis and we will keep this under review as it becomes established. Whilst the girls are encouraged to speak to any member of Surval staff they feel comfortable with, I recognise the importance of girls having an independent listener to turn to who is separate to the school staff. In addition, a School Nurse has been appointed for August which will enhance the medical arrangements provided by the school.

We also look forward to our planned focus on Healthy Lifestyle and Wellbeing in our themed focus next term with 'Mindful May'. This will provide the opportunity to involve girls in a range of activities and discussions to inspire a commitment to a healthy, balanced lifestyle, adopt a healthy approach to technology (this will complement a review of our policy on access to devices), and develop an understanding of the importance of healthy sleep patterns and balanced nutrition. Following the success of the ski session, we are looking forward to offering a wider range of outdoor activities next term to profit from our beautiful environment and fresh air. We will continually strive to make improvements in promoting Health and Wellbeing across the school.

I look forward to continuing to keep parents informed of current and planned developments in the school.

Languages & Culture



Languages & Culture

Interview with Erin

Swiss Gap Year 2020-2021, USA

Where are you studying now?

I'm currently studying as a freshman at Georgia State University. I've completed the qualifications for my Associate's degree in Psychology and I'm currently studying Religion and Philosophy.

How well do you think Surval prepared you for University?

Studying at Surval reignited my passion for learning in ways I didn't fully comprehend until I was starting my first semester at university. I was eager to hit the ground running and do my best to excel in all of my classes, but I also came out of my shell a lot during my time at Surval. I felt encouraged to break out of my comfort zone and participate more in school clubs and extracurricular activities.

What would you say to a girl thinking about joining Surval Montreux?

I would be honest with her and say that it can be a difficult transition if this is your first time away from home. Like any school there will be days where you just don't feel like doing the work, and you may find yourself feeling homesick. In the end it's all worth it though, and the good days definitely outweigh the bad. Gala Dinner

Dear Parents,

Warm greetings from Surval's Swiss Gap Experience students. We are happy to report that the annual Gala Dinner fundraising event in aid of the UNHCR Ukraine Emergency & Refugee Station held on the 5th of April was a success!

This charity project is aimed at those refugee stations in Ukraine, which have been struggling to aid the large number of refugees in need of shelter, food, water and other basic services as they escape their country under attack in the hope of safety.

Unseen UK is a UK based charity organization actively fighting the modern day slavery & exploitation crisis. We collaborated with a Survalienne, Miss Lucía Saiz Luque, to learn more about the issue. She inspired us with a wonderful and in-depth virtual presentation that opened our eyes and spurred us into action!

It seems the situation is worse than one would initially think - there are tens of millions of individuals forced into labour around the world. Human trafficking, child exploitation, domestic servitude, etc. are all types of this slavery. As women we must know that their cause is in fact our cause, as women and girls account for 99% of victims in the commercial sex industry, and 58% of victims in the rest of the industry.

However, activists make the difference! The charity creates safe houses available to those in dire circumstances, focuses on community building, and runs a 24/7 helpline. These resources are vital - they allow a safe space for victims to reach out and get removed from their un-healthy circumstances. They also offer training in modern day slavery awareness, so that you, as an active professional, employee, or student, can learn to better note the signs of maltreatment and take action!
